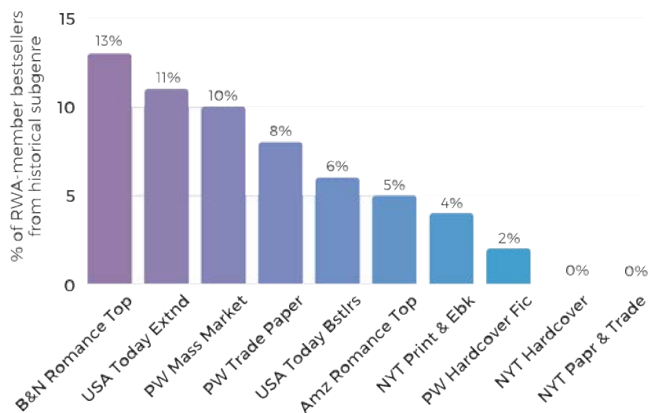

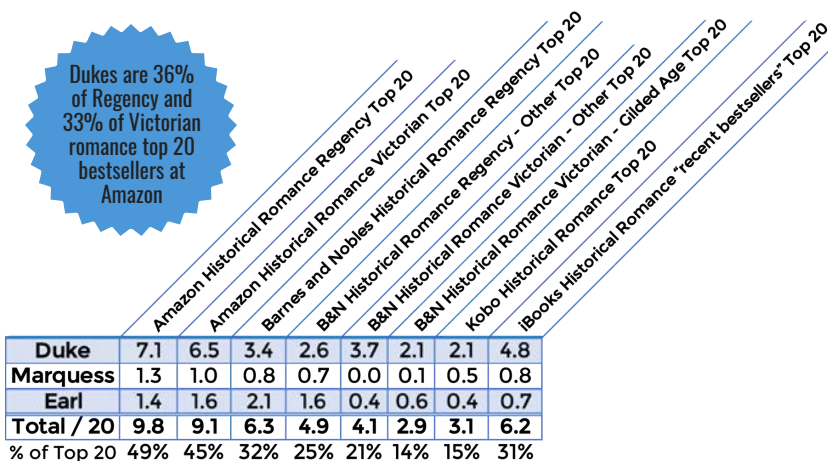

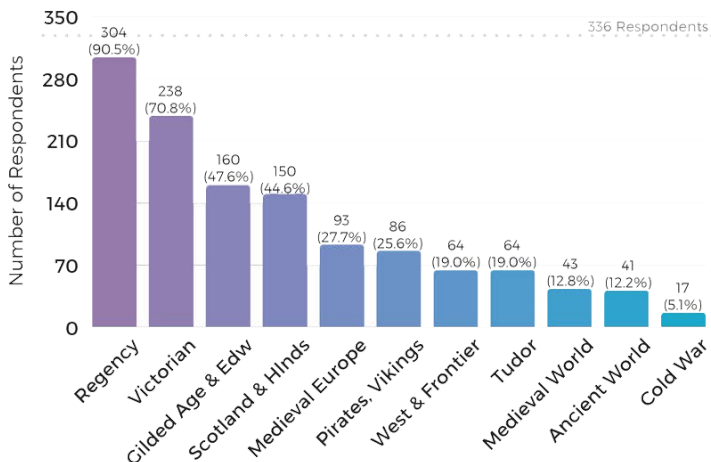

Dukes are 36% of Regency and 33% of Victorian romance top 20 bestsellers at Amazon

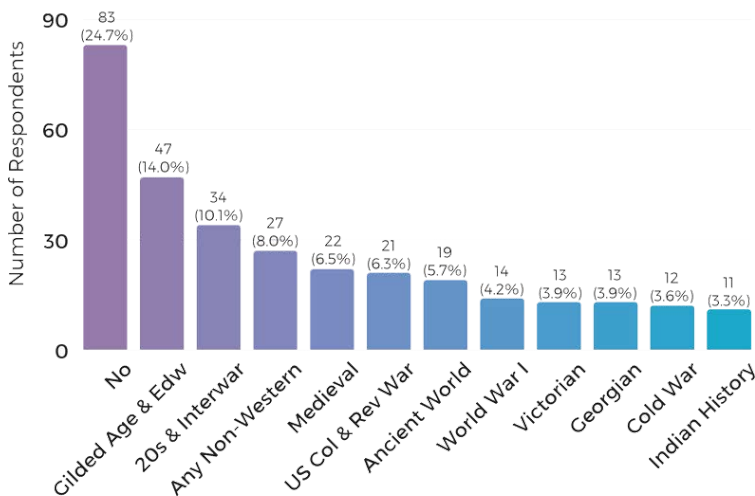


## Reader's Favorite Time Periods

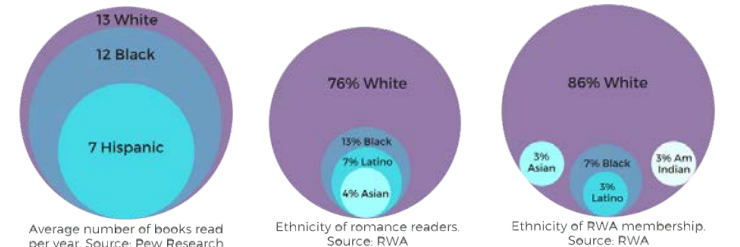
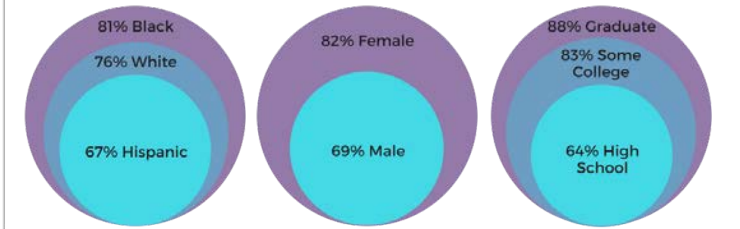
## Are there any time periods you would like to see used more by authors?
